

#### Vanessa Cunha

### Vanessa Cunha is a principal lecturer of the music and culture department at the Oulu University of Applied Sciences.

Brazilian-born pianist Vanessa Cunha has been acclaimed for her "sparkling electricity" and "musical will of iron." Her awards include numerous competitions in South America, the United States, and Europe. As a winner of the Artists International Auditions in New York, she played a critically acclaimed debut recital at the Weill Hall in Carnegie Recital Hall. Ms. Cunha has toured extensively in South America, the United States, Denmark, Finland, France, Spain, England, and Portugal.

Vanessa Cunha holds a Doctor of Musical Arts from the City University of New York and has studied with Martin Canin and Matti Raekallio. Among the musicians who have strongly contributed to her musical growth are Glacy Antunes, Neusa França, Luis Carlos de Moura Castro, Alicia Delarrocha, Adraas Schiff, David Dubal, Peter Eicher, and Byron Janis.

Actively involved with current music, Dr. Cunha has performed works by composers such as Marlos Nobre, Ronaldo Miranda, Edino Krieger, Jouko Tötterström, and Cecilia Damström, among others. She is a graduate of the Federal University of Rio de Janeiro, where she studied with Myrian Dauelsberg and received a Master's Degree. As the recipient of a full scholarship from CAPES, she graduated from the Manhattan School of Music with a Professional Studies in Piano Performance degree under the guidance of Nina Svetlanova.

She has been the soloist with numerous orchestras, including the Brazilian Symphony Orchestra, Blumenau Chamber Orchestra, Paraná Symphony Orchestra, State of São Paulo Symphony Orchestra, Philharmonic Orchestra of UFRJ, Symphony Orchestra of Brasília, Minas Gerais Symphony Orchestra, Orquestra do Norte in Portugal, and Oulu Symphony Orchestra in Finland, collaborating with conductors Norton Morozowics, Eleazar de Carvalho, Elena Herrera, Roberto Tibiriça, Fabio Mechetti, José Ferreira Lobo, and Tibor Boganey. She has also appeared as a featured artist on radio and television stations including Houston's Kuhf.fm, Brasília.fm Super Radio, TV Cultura, TV Anhanguera, and Manchete Television Network.

Vanessa Cunha has given masterclasses at universities, colleges, and music festivals, and has adjudicated music competitions in the U.S., Brazil, and Europe. She has been invited to perform and teach masterclasses at the Oklahoma City University, Aaron Copland School of Music, Londrina Winter Music Festival, Ouro Branco Music Festival, Nova Friburgo and Petrópolis Festivals, Oulu Music Festival, Joroinen Festival, Sonkajärvi Festival, and Kemi Music Festival.

Petri Hoppu holds the title of Adjunct Professor (Docent) in Dance Studies at Tampere University. His extensive expertise spans theory and methodology in dance anthropology, the intricate dance-music interface, and the rich traditions of Finnish-Karelian folk dances and ancient dance music. Additionally, Petri is deeply involved in the revitalization of Nordic dance and music.


Petri's academic journey culminated in a PhD in Ethnomusicology from the University of Tampere in 1999. His scholarly pursuits have led him to manage significant research projects, including "Dance in Nordic Spaces" from 2007 to 2012 and "KanTaMus," which focused on developing a common pedagogy for folk dance and music between 2021 and 2023.

As an author and editor, Petri has made substantial contributions to the field. He co-edited "Nordic Dance Spaces: Practicing and Imagining a Region" in 2014 with Professor Karen Vedel and the special issue "In and Out of Norden - Dance and the Migratory Condition" for the Dance Research Journal in 2020 with Professor Inger Damsholt. Since 2002, he has also been the editor of the annual Nordic folk dance research journal, Folkdansforksning i Norden.

Petri's professional activities extend beyond research and publication. He is an active member of international dance scholars' associations and has lectured at universities across Europe and the United States. His selected works include "The Nordic Minuet: Royal Fashion and Peasant Tradition" (2023) and "Dancing Agency: Skolt Saami Identities in Transition" (2014), which highlight his diverse research interests and contributions to the field.
